# Meeting with Associate Dean Benedet

## Orientation

- Change to 3-day length went well
- Pros: PBSC, LSLAP, Careers panel
- Mixed: Respectful Dialogue (but to be expected)
- Complaints: Too much sitting
- First year adjustment issues
  - LRW started with legislation instead of cases and O-Week didn't include the "how to brief a case" session
  - Still struggling with Public Law
    - Hard to ask questions in big class
    - In-class assignment causing anxiety
- Benedet: Starting next year schedule already and will consider updates to Public Law format/curriculum
  - Expense to set up forum

#### Wellness

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## Midterm Student Evaluations
